Study With Esteemed Teacher Heloise Degrugillier at a Reduced Cost

Heloise Degrugillier, based in the Boston area, is a well-known and highly regarded teacher in recorder and early music circles. When she came to Washington, DC, in 2014 and 2015 to perform and offer workshops, she made a tremendous impression on recorder players in our area. One evaluation from a workshop in October 2015 sponsored by Capitol Early Music said "Heloise's technique class alone was worth the workshop tuition." During the 2015-2016 season, she came to Washington on several occasions to offer individual and ensemble lessons. Heloise will be returning to Washington the weekend of September 17-18, and will be returning to offer more lessons in

November and on several additional weekends this coming winter and spring. Besides being an amazing teacher, Heloise is a very nice and approachable person. When we asked her whether she confined her teaching to specific levels of students, her reply was that the only kind of students she doesn't like to teach is those "who don't actually want to learn. President's Column

Welcome to the 2016-2017 season of the Washington Recorder Society! I am excited at the many opportunities that we are offering this year for Washington area recorder enthusiasts like you to rehearse, perform, and socialize with other likeminded folks: explore a wide range of music; and enhance your technique and musicianship.

Our biweekly "Antiqua" and "Nova" meetings. Our season begins on Monday, September 19, and continues into early June of 2017. The year's schedule is enclosed with this newsletter, and also posted on our web page.

Our meetings alternate between Antiqua and Nova sessions, which all take place from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Mondays at the Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church, 9601 Cedar Lane, Bethesda, Maryland. At our Antiqua meetings, we begin with a short concert by a local recorder ensemble or other music group, and then split into two groups to explore and rehearse different types of music together. The larger Antiqua group usually has several players per part, and is open to anyone who can play at least one type of recorder (alto, tenor, bass, or soprano). This group is led by Dick Shrager, a long-time WRS member and accomplished musician familiar with a wide range of music. The other Antiqua group is open to players who can play at least several different types of recorders and are comfortable playing one to a part, and is coordinated by long-time WRS member and former WRS President Jayme Sokolow. At our Nova meetings, we all play together in one large group, as a kind of "recorder orchestra." David McGown, an outstanding musician with extensive knowledge of music history, will lead Nova rehearsals this year.

At our first, Antiqua meeting on September 19, we will enjoy a short

concert by the Bethesda Chamber Singers, who have delighted us with their musicianship for a number of vears.

Other meetings. On Monday, December 19, we will all get together for our annual holiday partyplaying holiday music and enjoying refreshments and each other's company. On Monday, April 17, we will hold our annual instrument and sheet music auction.

One of the highlights of the year is our annual spring recital, which will be on Saturday. May 6. At this event. our different WRS ensembles perform for our members and their friends and families, and there are opportunities for members and other local recorder players to perform solos, duets, trios, or other small ensembles.

Workshops. We are excited this year to offer two all-day Saturday workshops, led by famous musicians and excellent recorder teachers: Gwvn Roberts on November 5, and Shelley Gruskin on March 25. Both Gwyn and Shelley are skilled and highly regarded teachers. More information about Gwyn Roberts' workshop is in this newsletter; information about Shelley's workshop will be forthcoming in future months.

Opportunities for individual study.

For the first time this year, WRS will be offering an incentive for members who wish to take lessons with esteemed recorder player and teacher Heloise Degrugillier, during her visits to Washington, DC, from her home city of Boston. More details are in a separate article in this newsletter.

Gwyn is well known to WRS members. Based in Philadelphia, she is world-class recorder and traverso virtuoso and a highly acclaimed teacher. She is on the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania and Peabody Conservatory, and founder and co-director of the Tempesto di Mare Baroque Orchestra. She teaches a number of Washington area recorder players, and has taught WRS workshops for a number of years.

Gwyn is an extremely engaging, motivating, and fun teacher. She is humorous and kind, while also being rigorous and insightful. She also is quite knowledgeable about music history and early music performance practice. Those of us who have taken her past workshops learn something new each time.

The workshop will be held on Saturday, November 5, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church. Participants should bring their own lunches, but drinks, desserts, and morning and afternoon snacks will be provided.
