WRS Membership Has Many Benefits!

Joining the Washington Recorder Society (WRS) brings many benefits! Members have the opportunity to:

- Play music with recorder players of similar skills—and to expand their musical experience by playing with more advanced musicians. Some groups prepare music for performance, and others read new and exciting works.
- Hear local consorts. Once a month, a local ensemble performs for WRS at a meeting, so members are introduced to new music and playing skills.
- Attend local workshops at a discount. WRS sponsors several day-long workshops a year in which expert teachers

demonstrate new techniques and musical literature. The participants then play the music under their direction and receive feedback as a group.

- Perform in a concert. Each spring WRS presents a high-caliber concert of ensembles and solo works for friends and family.
 Members of the Society are both performers and audience.
- Support recorder players and other musicians in the greater Washington area interested in early music. WRS meetings, workshops, and recitals offer opportunities for area amateur musicians to perform and to hear others perform—learning from others and in turn helping others learn new skills. WRS also financially contributes to the annual Amherst Early Music (AEM) Spring Break Workshop in DC. (See the separate article in this newsletter.)
- Receive newsletter and email reminders. WRS issues a quarterly newsletter about past and upcoming events and items of general interest to recorder players, and periodically sends notices of special events.
- e Explore the WRS website. The website provides important information about meetings, Board members, upcoming workshops, and other WRS business. It also includes links to other useful sites and recorder music. The members-only area has contact information for other members and a large collection of recorder music arrangements exclusive to WRS.

In the morning, the workshop will focus on "Descriptive Music, 14th through 18th Centuries: Programmatic Depictions of Birds, Animals, Smoking, Etc., Etc." This should be great music and great fun, especially for those who like imitating different species of birds on their recorders.

In the afternoon, the workshop will focus on "The Renaissance Art of Cantus Firmus Composition: A Quest for Originality—Dufay, Josquin, and Dowland." With these three musical giants, who could have a better afternoon?

The workshop will take place at the Church of the Atonement, 10613 Georgia Avenue, Silver Spring, MD 20902 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Refreshments will be provided. Bring your instruments, music stands, and a lunch.
