We will be meeting once a month via Zoom. Many Thanks to Art Jacobson

The energetic and always amusing Art Jacobson has retired from the WRS Board after many years of service. Art joined WRS in 2001 and became a Board member in 2004. He served as WRS President for 7 years—from 2005 until 2012—and then was Treasurer for the following 3 years. We thought we would let Art share some of his memories with the recorder and with WRS in (an edited version of) his own words. Thank you, Art—and we look forward to continuing to see you on Zoom and when we resume in-person meetings! And we encourage other WRS members to share your memories with us, for future newsletters!

"If I were to be asked when I started playing the recorder, I would have to think back to my graduate school days at Rutgers University, in one of the Oranges (that's a town, not a fruit). My fellow mate, who shared our wee apartment, thought it would be great to start a recorder group. That grad school recorder group experience was the beginning of my long attempt to gain recorder skills. It's hard to believe for you young whippersnappers, but that was more than 60 years ago. And the playing quickly ended—after perhaps 1 year. I transferred to New Brunswick for a course change, in an attempt to get a Ph.D. in organic chemistry. The time it took trying to get that degree made recorder playing a passing thought.

"It wasn't until I got a job at the NIH (where I still work) that I reconsidered recorder playing. After lessons that emphasized how fast one could play a recorder without making too many errors, and starting to write musical scores, like 'Mary had a sort of small lamb,' I quit again. Like the times before, this one due to marriage, children, mortgages,



teaching night classes, working at NIH, serving on my Temple's board, that stuff precluded my ability to continue recorder playing, unless it was to play a few notes so the kids would be entranced by the noise. Until, I think it was in 1999 or 2000, right before I retired from civil service, I decided to try to really learn to play the recorder.

"It was then, in about 2001, that I looked up recorder societies on the internet, found WRS, and brought my alto recorder to a meeting. I remember being absolutely fascinated by the music played by some small group at the meeting, and found myself seated next to Jayme Sokolow, then President of the WRS, in the large room in the Bethesda Unitarian Church. Without a music stand. Who knew to bring a music stand? Jayme lent me one of his. Thereafter, I joined the beginners' group with Kay Jones initially, and continued with first Jane Udelson and then both Jane and Bruce Crane as my teachers, and they were great and very patient teachers. Additional private lessons began a few years later with Suzana Cooper, followed by Rachel Isaacson. Please don't blame my teachers, they were excellent. It's the student

"When Jane Udelson and Myrl Powell, Co-Presidents, decided not to run again. Jane leaned on me, and I became WRS President. In 2012 Vickie [Walter] became President, and I became Treasurer. In 2015 a new group, with a much better President than I ever was, came to the leadership roles. On June 6, 2015, I became emeritus after about 14 years as a voting member of the Board, joyfully serving pretzels and tea for WRS Board meetings (truthfully, my wife Linda served the tea and provided the pretzels), until November 2020, when I retired from the Board. This, then, is a tale of a 16-year sojourn as a WRS voting Board member. I recommend that to all our WRS members, give it a shot—you don't need to hang in there quite that long, but it's a worthwhile effort.

"Now I am just an ordinary member of WRS. That is not entirely true, most, if not all, ordinary WRS members play the recorder fairly well.

"So, as the old melody goes, thanks-for the memory"
