Online Resources for Playing, Practicing, Learning, and Having Fun!

As the COVID pandemic drags on, the creativity of our teachers and organizations continues to grow!

- Tish Berlin and Frances Blaker regularly offer 5- or 6-week "Practice Challenges." Participants commit to practice every day (for as much as you can-even 5 minutes counts!), and receive weekly letters from Tish and Frances and the opportunity to join a listserv of those participating. There is also a "paid tier" that entitles one to weekly links to 2- and 3-part music in which you can join Tish and Frances by playing one part while they play other lines. JamKazam

Have you ever tried to play music on Zoom and noticed that it was a jumbled mess? The reason is latency. It takes time for the sound to go from your instrument to your computer through the Internet to someone else's computer to their ears. An organization called JamKazam has developed a way to mitigate the time delays and allow musicians to play together in real time. It was written in 2014 but has really taken off this year. WRS members are using it for playing together and also taking lessons. It works best for a small number of players that are geographically close.

JamKazam was free until January 2021, when they established subscription plans. You can still try it out for free, but if it works and you like it, you should sign up for the silver (\$5), gold (\$10), or platinum (\$20) plans per month. If you are a member of the Associated Chamber Music Players (ACMP), you can get the gold plan for half-price; see https://acmp.net/.

There are a few requirements for playing on JamKazam. It will not work on WiFi, so you must use an Ethernet cord between your modem and your computer. You may need an USB adapter if your computer doesn't have an Ethernet port. You also need a set of wired headphones. The type with an open back are best, but even earbuds will work as long as there is a wire attached. Your computer must have either an internal or external microphone. All of the equipment mentioned can be obtained online, such as through Amazon.

In Memorium: Ellen Lehner (1930–2020)

Long-time WRS member Ellen Lehner died on November 12, 2020. She led an eventful life. Born in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1930, in 1939 she and her brother left for England on the *Kindertransport*, which brought thousands of Jewish children to England 9 months prior to World War II. Ellen arrived in the United States in 1943 to join her parents in New Jersey. After the war, she received a Ph.D. in Mathematics from Purdue University and taught for decades in the Mathematics Department at the University of Maryland at College Park. Ellen loved to travel here and abroad and was an outdoors enthusiast. She also enjoyed playing the recorder at WRS for many years. Ellen was devoted to WRS, and she served on the board during the 1990s. A strong and independent woman, Ellen loved Renaissance and Baroque music and was an avid and adept recorder player.

In Memorium: Anne Hinton (1934–2020)

Long-time WRS member Anne Hinton died on December 19, 2020. After graduating from high school as valedictorian, Anne studied zoology at Cornell University and graduated from the Cornell Medical School in 1957. She was one of only four women in her class. Anne was a pediatrician and was devoted to public health. For many years she worked in DC-area clinics, caring for children in need. Anne also enjoyed playing the recorder, especially the tenor recorder. She played with WRS for many years, helped set up refreshments for the Antiqua meetings, and served on the board of WRS during the 1990s. Anne will be remembered as a sweet, kind, and gracious person who made everyone feel welcome, whether it was at her house in Bethesda for WRS board meetings or at WRS Nova and Antiqua meetings.



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
