American Recorder Society

March is "Play the Recorder" month. Many chapters, consorts and recorder orchestras are being creative to plan ways to illustrate the versatility and beauty of this wonderful instrument. The centerpiece of the month is the commissioned piece, *een mentaliteit* by Providence-based composer Jamie Allen. It was inspired by the late recorder icon, Frans Brüggen (1938-2014) who was known for saying, "*blokfluit spelen is een mentaliteit*." (Recorder playing is a state of mind.) ARS members will have received the piece with the Winter, 2023 edition of the American Recorder Magazine.

WRS is a chapter of the American Recorder Society (ARS), which provides many resources for all recorder players, including its own YouTube channel, which has many free videos and information. The ARS site also has free music and play-alongs. The web site address is https://americanrecorder.org/. The initial membership fee is \$25, with an annual charge of \$55 thereafter, for access to many resources. Consider joining. The ARS offers scholarships for workshops and classes.

The North American Virtual Recorder Society

NAVRS has a new music director, Annette Bauer. She will be leading the March 23 meeting, "Spring is in the Air." She has selected music from across the centuries that celebrate the season of spring, the return of longer days, bird song, and the reawakening of nature. The Zoom link will be live, beginning at 1:30 pm Eastern time. In addition, a Members-Only meeting will be held on March 3. Rotem Gilbert will conduct a workshop entitled "A Woman's Voice: Musical Settings of Poetry." To sign up, go to https://www.navrs.org. The website also includes details about ways to make the most of virtual playing as well as information about this year's program.

The North American Virtual Recorder Society was initially an idea that grew out of the pandemic, as a safe space for players who didn't feel comfortable meeting other players in person. It continues to serve a community of players who don't have a local chapter or consort, who cannot gather with other players, or who simply want more playing time. Its first virtual playing session, in December, 2021, attracted over 100 players. Today membership has grown to 189 and represents 4 Canadian Provinces and 36 U. S. States. President Mike Richart said, "I'm excited at the abundance of opportunities we'll have to learn and grow together as a recorder community...and invite you to join us." The year-round playing meetings feature ensemble music for players of every age and stage. Your first playing meeting does not require annual membership, but after that you must be an NAVRS Chapter member to attend. The annual membership fee is \$20, and playing meetings are \$15 per session

Mollie Habermeier Answers Whence Recorder Questionnaire

Did you sing or play other instruments before you took up recorder?

I started playing recorder in elementary school, and I had not previously played an instrument. I wanted to continue with music, and the teacher told me to pick a "real" instrument, so I switched to clarinet. I played clarinet through high school and college, but then I didn't play any instruments for years. When my daughter was playing recorder in elementary school, I remembered how much fun it was, so I started playing recorder again.

Do you have a musical family?

As I was growing up, there were often classical music recordings playing, and I was taken to performances, but my parents did not play musical instruments.

Do you sing or play instruments other than recorder now? No.

Do you compose or arrange music? No.

Do you think there's any type of music that doesn't sound good on the recorder?

I used to think that classical orchestral music did not sound good on recorder. Then I participated in a WRS performance of Grieg's "Peer Gynt Suite" and really liked it, so I don't think that any more. Helen-Jean Talbott wrote the arrangement. It calls for many recorder sizes, from the smallest to the largest. Most people don't have them all, but the WRS as a group does.

What's your approach to playing recorder?

I play to enjoy the music, and to enjoy playing with other people.

How do you find the time?

Even when I am busy, I try to play at least 10 minutes a day, just to keep the momentum going.

Do you have a teacher?

Yes, I take lessons from Gwyn Roberts.

Do you play duets or in larger ensembles? Do you attend workshops?

Yes to all. We are fortunate to have a lot of recorder players and players of other early instruments in this area. I attend music workshops here and other places.

Do you approach performance with enthusiasm or dread?

I do get nervous about performing, but I remind myself that the audience is there because they enjoy the same music that I do, and I am giving them a chance to hear it.

How long have you been a member of WRS? Since 2010.

Is there a performer—solo or group—that has inspired you throughout your recorder-playing life?

I have been listening to the Baltimore Consort since before I returned to recorder. I grew to love early music listening to them.

What are your 3 favorite recordings featuring recorder? My favorites vary, but my current one is the video of Purcell's "Strike the Viol" performed by Les Musiciens de Saint-Julien and François Lazarevitch. There is an audio version, too, but in the video, you can see the musicians enjoying playing together.

If you were a castaway on a desert island, which one of your recorders would you hope you had with you? Either a renaissance tenor, because I love the full and beautiful tone, or a baroque alto.
