Reiko Yoshimura Answers Whence the Recorder Questionnaire

Do you have a musical family? No, but my father introduced me to a recording of a Beethoven's piano concerto when I was in the first grade, which was my first encounter to classical music. Soon after I started taking piano lessons.

Did you sing or play other instruments before you took up recorder? I played piano and flute. Now I play keyboard occasionally for fun.

Do you compose or arrange music? No.

Do you think there's any type of music that doesn't sound good on the recorder? I am not crazy about playing music beyond the instrument's capacity. For instance, I have never thought that recorder was suitable for playing jazz music. However, this could be a matter of how the music is arranged.

What's your approach to playing recorder? I like to play ensemble music. I enjoy thinking of my role in the ensemble to create a musical whole, not just a group of musicians playing individual parts.

Do you have a teacher? I study with Gwyn Roberts.

Do you play duets or in larger ensembles? I am a member of two recorder consorts: one is a recorder quartet (baroque/renaissance) and the other, a renaissance consort (two recorders, lute, and gamba). I also occasionally play duets and solo/trio sonatas with a keyboard player.

Do you attend workshops? I regularly attend Amherst Early Music, Capitol Early Music, and Virginia Baroque Academy workshops.

Do you approach performance with enthusiasm or dread? For many years I freaked out about performing in front of people and was the worst public performer. Only recently I realized that all I need to do is to focus on how I want to play my own music within my capacity, not to impress others. It seems to be working. My favorite comment from listeners is "Your music healed me."

How long have you been a member of WRS? Since 1990.

Has membership benefited you in ways you didn't anticipate? I must admit that I have not been the most faithful participant, but WRS has been a great place to meet other recorder players and to play music, especially in large ensembles.

Do you have any good stories about meetings, recitals, or other group activities over the years? There are two major milestones in my recorder playing. One of them is meeting my teacher, Gwyn Roberts, twenty years ago. She made me want to play recorder more seriously and taught me so much during the last twenty years. The other milestone is encountering renaissance music and instruments. I was lucky enough to obtain Prescott renaissance instruments, which introduced me to another world of recorder music. I fell in love with it!

Is there a performer—solo or group—that has inspired you throughout your recorder-playing life? Gwyn Roberts, Frans Brüggen and Flanders Recorder Quartet.

What are your 3 favorite recordings featuring recorder? --Flanders Recorder Quartet. *Final Favorites* (AE-10286, Aeolus, 2017) Flanders Recorder Quartet. *Bach* (AE-10136, Aeolus, 2006)

If you were a castaway on a desert island, which one of your recorders would you hope you had with you? This question is difficult to answer. If I had to choose, it would be Stanesby Junior 415 alto which nurtured me for many years. However, it is no fun to play music alone!
